Nut free school

We use wellies at break time when the ground is wet. Please ensure you have a names pair of wellies in school. The PTA paid for welly boot racks for every class to have. They **will not** be allowed on the field or in to be with the chickens if they do not have wellies in school.

Healthy Snacks at breaktimes.

We encourage the children to eat healthy snacks at break times such as fruit, raw veg, or breadsticks, not chocolate or crisps . KS1 and EYFS have fruit provided for them each day as part of the National scheme. We will be reminding of this each week, please support us in doing the same and reminding them in the mornings.

It's going to be an exciting term and I'm thrilled that they have settled so quickly. Well done Parents, you have done a great job in preparing them for school






Year 1

- 1. Aspects of internet safety we have been looking at to stay safe:
- 2. If someone is being nasty to you on the internet or using a phone don't respond and don't reply!
- 3. You should tell a trusted adult straight away if someone is upsetting you, or if you have been getting upsetting messages.
- 4. Never tell anyone who you don't know in the real world your address, your mobile number, your name or which school you go to.
- 5. Never share photos or use a webcam with people you don't know in the real world.
- 6. Always ask permission before you play games on the internet.
- 7. Always delete emails from people you don't know. They might be nasty or have a virus which can stop your computer working.
- 8. Don't tell anyone your password.
- 9. One of the most important things you need to remember is to treat people how you would like to be treated. Be kind and nice when you write anything on the computer so you don't upset anyone.
