
So for **topic work** this week, I would like you to do a 'Bird Watch' and observe the types of birds that have entered into your garden [or park]over a period of time [a day, a few hours, an hour at the same time over a period of days]. I have noticed new visitors in my garden: a coal tit and a wren.

This will give you ideas how to attract them into the garden. **Create a poster or a report** and use persuasive language e.g. How to attract birds into the garden -why you would choose brightly coloured plants to attract birds etc. Could you show a bar graph of the numbers of 'types of birds' in the garden.

Write a description as a bird

WALT: write a poem based on impactful words, phrases and imagery

Describe how it moves and what it sees. Use all the senses. There is a DCAT and a Chartres competition: this is the chance to write some poetry. Remember you could use repetition, have a chorus, questions, several stanzas [verses], kennings [ie fly-catcher, worm-worrier]. You all have a good imagination so how would you fly? Catch food? Watch out for predators? As I have shown you before, group together words on slips of paper, move them around to create a lines of poetry. Remember you could figurative language, similes, metaphors, alliteration – But be economical with adjectives – not too many.
