SPORTS PREMIUM FUNDING REPORT AUTUMN 2013

Over the last year, you may have heard in the media about Sports Premium Funding. The government is providing additional funding of £150 million per annum for academic years 2013 to 2014 and 2014 to 2015 to improve provision of physical education (PE) and sport in primary schools. This funding - provided jointly by the Departments for Education, Health and Culture, Media and Sport - will be allocated to primary school headteachers. This funding is ring-fenced and therefore can only be spent on provision of PE and sport in schools.

Funding for schools will be calculated by reference to the number of primary-aged pupils (between the ages of 5 and 11), as recorded in the annual schools census in January 2013. Schools must spend the additional funding on improving their provision of PE and sport, but they will have the freedom to choose how they do this.

At The March we are committed to this funding making a difference for children not just in the following two years, but longer term as well.

In spending the funding we take into account the following factors;

- The increase in participation rates in such activities as games, dance, gymnastics, swimming and athletics
- The increase and success in competitive school sports
- How much more inclusive the physical education curriculum has become
- The growth in the range of provisional and alternative sporting activities
- The improvement in partnership work on physical education with other schools and other local partners
- Links with other subjects that contribute to pupils' overall achievement and their greater social, spiritual, moral and cultural skills
- The greater awareness amongst pupils about the dangers of obesity, smoking and other such activities that undermine pupils' health.

Remaining funding:

Any funds remaining are to be spent during next financial year (March 2014 – July 2014). Funding saved until this date due to time allocation of funding from Departments for Education, Health and Culture, Media and Sport and the possibility of change e.g. events being cancelled or added.

Funding may also be used to bring in specialist coaches or organisations for Sport Relief and National School Sports Week 2014. Specialist coaches will allow all children to access an area of physical education that they may not have access to within the curriculum and raise awareness of important of a healthy lifestyle.

A new partnership has been agreed by 12 primary schools that will give children opportunities for competitive football, netball, cricket, tag rugby and Olympic events. The Schools Sports Partnership (West Sussex West) is still running and will provide The March with Sainsbury School Games competitions. The March will also be able to buy into training for staff and extra competitions.
