Year R Chick News

This has been a very exciting term for Reception. It began with the children designing their own Topic, from the big question 'How Do You Make Chickens?' to deciding how that might lead into other interesting ideas that they wanted to investigate.

Their ideas drove the learning from talking about eggs, what was inside the egg, how it would feel to be inside an egg and hatch, to different environments, body parts and how they work, how to handle to animals and creatures with care, and how diet and food affects growth and then of course wanting to hatch our own eggs.

Unbelievably, we managed to hatch 5 Bantam chicks and the children watched in amazment as the chicks first cracked the shell, poked out a beak and then finally breaking the shell to enter the world as a wet, bedraggled creature that they hardly recognized as a chick.



So we are now 'parents' to these bundles of fluff and the children are very eager to name them; the suggestions so far are Flinn, Greg, Jeff, Rainbow and Fluff ! (I'm not sure who'll make the final decision!!)



We also have fostered 3 very handsome Bantams, 2 hens and a cockerel, who are living in their fox proof henpod and run on the school field. This is to help us learn how to manage and care for them so that when our baby chicks are old enough to go outside, we will be well practiced in the art of looking after our own March Hens.

We hope this will become a whole school project with each class taking turns to care for the hens hands on for a week on a rota basis, to feed and care for them, and to collect their eggs! The Polar Explorer Programme Workshop

To celebrate Science week we arranged for one of the ambassadors for the Polar Explorer Programme, Jo Fox, to run an assembly and an ICT/DT workshop for classes in key Stage 2.

The Polar Explorer Programme encourages and supports schools who are keen to raise aspirations and attainment in science, technology, engineering and mathematics (STEM) and aims to inspire the next generation of scientists and engineers. The school had applied to the programme last year and was lucky enough to be accepted and fortunate enough to have a one-day workshop on programming and DT.

Jo, taught the children to program a robot to push and pull a carriage across the hall floor. The children, in pairs, constructed one and then using an ipad, programmed it to flash lights, make noises and move in different directions.

Year 6 were amazing and impressed Jo with their ability to work in a team. It was a brilliant workshop and the children were inspired!

Jo talked about RRS David Attenborough, the polar research ship with an automated submersible. It will enable scientists and technicians to stay at sea for longer and study the polar environments during the Antarctic and Arctic summer months. Year 6 was very interested in hearing this as they had just completed the 'Frozen Kingdom' topic in February and had researched the Polar Regions.

Forest School Spring

The Reception Class are very glad to have been able to resume Forest School back up at Seeley Copse after the very cold Spring Term 1.

Some of the activities that the children have enjoyed are making a Tree Family using clay to twist, squeeze and pinch, adding features with twigs



After reading the Easter story. The Tale of the Three Trees in school, the children wanted to make the three crosses .This involved many fine motor skills such as weaving and lashing with string

They were also interested in making a nest, deciding how best to stick the twigs together and ways to make it cosy.

We always enjoy the Trust games such as Hawk and Squawk, 1,2,3 Where are you? And The Woodlouse Game

Over the last 3 weeks the children have become very interested in shelter building and den making using a variety of materials, natural and manmade. They have used many skills as they dis-assembled and re-assembled different dens which involved a lot of discussion, lots of turn-taking and lots and lots of patience!



The activities are only a starting point and children may choose to take activities in a different direction from the one intended (or choose not to participate in the activity at all). Underpinning the whole of forest school is physical development which can be measured weekly by experimenting with different ways of moving, jumping off objects and landing appropriately, negotiating space successfully, adjusting speed or changing direction to avoid obstacles. Travelling with confidence and skill around under, over and through balancing and climbing.
