
Dear Families of the March CE Primary School,

This is the last week to go before a well-earned break for half term. This will also be a good time for us to reflect again on the google classroom feedback on what is working well and where we should focus attention for continued improvement.

The parental survey feedback showed that:

- 96.7% of parents thought we had set about right or too much online learning.
- 87% of parents thought their child received about right or too much feedback. In response to this some teachers are now responding with further online teaching suggestions for work submitted or further advice during live online feedback sessions
- **90%** would like to join a Friday celebration this has been incredibly popular with approx. 180 children present.
- There were lots of very positive comments and we thank you for the support at this difficult time for everyone.
- We have taken on board some of the areas needed for further support and have asked teachers to let pupils know time expectations for different work and appreciate this may take children different times to complete. So, please do what you child can cope with on that day. The twice-daily google meets will give the teachers opportunities to discuss the expectations and teach concepts, we would encourage the children to ask questions at this time or ask for further help.

Do you think the amount of work your child has been given is: 61 responses








There is no further news on the Governments plans for 8th March yet.
