Blood Heart: Year 6

Children in Year 6 enjoyed their stunning start for their latest topic Blood Heart. Here they looked in detail at the lungs and heart from a sheep and explored how the lungs inflate and help to oxygenate the blood. Children described the looks, smell and texture of the organs and compared them to a nice fillet steak!

In future lessons they made blood 'smoothies' from raspberries and white 'squashies' to help them understand the different elements contained in blood such as white blood cells and blood plasma.

More recently they have been designing experiments to explore the effect of exercise and rest on pulse rate and thought carefully about the changes that occur during exercise.

It has been an engaging topic with lots of memorable learning experiences!









The Christingle Service is one of our favourite of the year as we prepare for Christmas. Christingle celebrations are named after the Christingles that are lit during the service. Christingles are made from an orange decorated with red tape, sweets and a candle. The whole school make the Christingles which is mammoth task but one that is a tradition in our school and one that they always remember.

<u>Year 5</u>

The children in Class 5 have really enjoyed their learning about the Tudors era this term, even the gruesome elements! They have been amazing at discussing the adventures of Will, who is working in the court of Henry VIII, in their class novel Treason. They have all written excellent biographies and persuasive letters linked to their topic. They have also worked very hard in maths to master fractions and have been great scientists in investigating the effect of air resistance on parachutes. We were particularly proud of them on their class visits to the Cathedral and Pallant House Gallery, where their behaviour was exemplary and they developed their knowledge and skills in art, producing wonderful still-life collages.



Year 4

This half term **Year 4** have been learning about a range of subjects as part of our Unit 'Misty Mountains'. The children have been writing a rescue story based on a famous mountain range from the text 'Touching the Void' and we are about to publish an explanation text on the water cycle. Supporting our learning in Destination Reader we have been using the book 'Mountains' where the children have explored the different types which can be found on Earth.

In Maths, we have been exploring the key relationship between multiplication and division whilst continuing the progress in times tables knowledge. In Science, we have looked at the changing states of matter producing our own water cycle experiment which are on display in the classroom.

We had a familiar visitor in the form of Mr Willson who brought in his climbing equipment for the children to explore as he explained the various expeditions he has been on. In Geography, we have been looking at the various mountains around the world and recognising whether they are fold, fault, block, volcanic, dome or Plateau Mountains. In Art, we have been mark making, drawing reflective images along with playdough and stamp printing. For Computing, we have completed some further coding with Scratch, which the children have thoroughly enjoyed this half term. Our unit for PE was a focus on Hockey as a part of Invasion Games where we have moved to small-sided games with attacking and defending tactics.

We look forward to Spring 1 where our Topic will be on Traders and Raiders.



<u>Year 3</u>

Scrumdiddlyumptous has been a busy and engaging topic! We started the journey by looking at play scripts and plays in English. The children had lots of fun acting and writing their own play scripts. We then moved onto the power of instructional writing, learning how specific instructions must be to get to a finished product. Finally, persuasive writing was explored, looking at how adverts make you buy something you don't necessarily need.

With the topic being a food related topic, the children researched into seasonal fruits and sampled some non-seasonal fruits from around the world. We then created some delicious apple crumbles, with each child being part of the process. The children's favourite part of the crumbled was of course the eating!

How can we forget about the fantastic finish? We were lucky that Fun Food Academy were on hand to help bring our topic to a fabulous end. The children have been reading Charlie and the chocolate factory; therefore, there was only one way to end the topic... by making their own chocolate! We first tasted the chocolate, thinking about amazing adjectives to describe milk, dark and light chocolate, before designing our very own Wonka bars! Sian and Sarah then made our very own chocolate to pour into our boxes. The children then decorated and piped onto their bars, creating some marvellous March chocolate bars. Some of the comments from the children included: "Best day at school ever!". A big thank you to Fun Food Academy for providing such a spectacular finish to our topic.

I wish all of year three and the parents a magical happy Christmas. I hope many memories are made and I am very much looking forward to our next topic of heroes and villains.





Year R

We have come to the end of our second term, and it has been another great one. Thank you to all of you for being so helpful and cooperative with our 'Starry Night' topic, and with all the Christmas preparations. The children have worked very hard this term and I hope you have enjoyed seeing them develop and grow.

The children are continuing to make fantastic progress in phonics and are becoming more confident in their independent reading. The children are clearly applying the skills they have learnt in Phonics sessions and from reading 1:1 with an adult, both in school and at home.

We have been exploring different art techniques and media. Our Jackson Pollock inspired Christmas tree artwork was particularly fun to create! We thoroughly enjoyed flicking the paint to make the tree picture and used different techniques to make the decorations, including blow painting and making dots.

We have continued to enjoy Forest School this term. We have linked our learning from school and have used the space to explore more about Nocturnal animals and night-time routines.





We've been hard at work learning lots of new songs and dances for our Nativity this term. The children have practiced and performed so well! We have had so much fun teaming up with Y1 and Y2 to deliver a great Nativity play.

<u>Year 1</u>

This half term our topic has been the Enchanted Woodland. Over the past weeks we have been learning about types of trees, woodland animals and natural art. We enjoyed our Mondays in the forest and were kept busy with our Nativity performances. The weather has been a bit wet at times so we had some forest school days at school. We learned about the continents and oceans in geography and created our own woodland maps. In art we have learning about famous artists and the use of lines and shapes in their work.





<u>Year 2</u>

This term we have been learning all about pirates, different countries, great explorers and map reading in our Land A'Hoy topic. The topic started off with Pirate Day where the children learnt to sing 30Sea Shanties and performed this outside and played PE treasure finding games. They also had their pirate workshop with Paul Ullson where they got to look inside a smugglers box.

They have also been busy learning about algorithms in computing and we have had a lot of fun with Google Quick Draw! The children have been busy designing and creating our moving 'under the sea' creatures as part of our Design Technology project. After an extremely busy and fun filled term, Year 2 have been looking ahead to Christmas, sharing what this time means for them and getting some time to spend with their families.

Keep it up choir - next term we are travelling to the 02 to sing in the Young Voices concert, this is the most amazing experience for the choir !!






